

Home Learning Instructions

Subject: Art year 6	Week commencing: 12/10/2020
Objectives: To create an abstract portrait inspired by the Cubism movement. To show understanding of hot and cold colours.	
Learning activities (in order to be completed): Firstly, have a read through the PowerPoint slide on Cubism . Think about the following: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. How does Cubism relate to your current project 'Peculiar Portraits'?2. Which is your favourite image and why?3. How can you take your favourite elements from this image into your own work? Follow the steps from the 'How to draw a Cubism portrait' document. Ensure you draw very lightly with your pencil so that mistakes can be easily erased. You do not have to follow each step if you would rather take inspiration from a different image. Once you have completed your drawing, take some time to reflect and refine any areas. It is too late to edit your drawing once you have applied colour. When you add colour, we are going to keep away from the earthy tones traditionally used in Cubism art work. You should colour half of the face in hot colours , and half of the face in cold colours . Your background should use harmonious colours , making use of colour that you have not used in the face. Make sure you are blending colours together, and using different pressures with your crayon to create different tones . This Art work is best completed using pencil crayons, however if you have paints or watercolours at home they would be fantastic to use too.

Key vocabulary: Pablo Picasso: A 20th century artist Abstract: Art that does not represent reality Cubism: An early 20th century art movement Hot colours: A group of colours; Red, Orange, Yellow. Cold colours: A group of colours; Blue, Green, Purple. Harmonious colours: Colours that sit next to each other on the colour wheel, for example; yellow and orange.
